In the late morning, depart for Hvar. The island of Hvar is the queen of the Croatian Dalmatian islands. The ancient city has a rich history. With its architecture, beautiful nature and mild climate many would describe it as a true fairy-tale city.

Hvar Town may be the most stunning town on the island but don't miss the chance to visit Stari Grad, the oldest village on the island, and Jelsa, as well as a smattering of small villages dotting the coast.

Hvar > Trogir

Declared a World Heritage Town in 1997 by Unesco, the town of Trogir is rich in history.

Nicknamed the "Stone Beauty", this gorgeous seaside city is considered to be one of the best preserved medieval towns in Europe.

Trogir is perfect for aimless wandering and leisurely exploring. It checks all of the boxes for my "perfect small town" criteria: walkable, scenic, easygoing vibe, great local food, and ideal for people-watching.

Do not miss the Cathedral of St Lawrence, its bell tower was built in the 14th and 16th centuries and can be climbed to see fantastic views from the top.

Trogir > Sibenik & Krka Falls

Holding the title of the oldest native Croatian town on the Adriatic coast, Sibenik served as the seat of Croatian kings in the past, including King Petar Kresimir, after whom the city was named. So-called Kresimir's city, located in the bay where the river Krka meets the Adriatic Sea.

Krka is one of the two Croatian national parks that contain lakes and waterfalls! Situated in the middle of Šibenik-Knin county in Croatia Krka national park covers a total area of 109 km². Krka is actually a river in Dalmatia, Croatia's southern-most province, which due to the local terrain forms into beautiful waterfalls. Krka river has 7 travertine barriers and a unique ecosystem.

Kornati



The Kornatis, also known as the Stomorski islands, are composed of 130 uninhabited islands, islets and reefs. They are the largest and most dense archipelago in the Adriatic sea.

The island of Dugi Otok with its deep bay Telašćica is situated in the immediate vicinity, northwest of the Kornati archipelago, and forms, together with the Kornati islands, a unique natural and cultural entity.

One of the most famous phenomena found in the Kornati National Park and the Telašćica Nature Park are the 'crowns', locally known as krune or stene, i.e. steep cliffs found on southwestern island's edges of both parks.

Kornati > Zadar

A city of romance and love, a place of passion and spirit! Zadar is the oldest continuously-inhabited Croatian city.

Surrounded by historical ramparts, Zadar is treasury of the archaeological and monumental riches of ancient and medieval times, Renaissance and many contemporary architectural achievements such as the first Sea Organ in the world.

Enjoy a beauiful day discovering the city and its hidden treasures.

Zadar > Brac



Wake up in Brac!

Brac is the largest insland in central Dalmatia, with several towns and villages and a dramatic landscape of steep cliffs, inky waters and pine forests. The highest peak of the island, Vidova Gora (778m), isthe highest peak of all Croatian islands.

Brac is renowned for its vine. The most common grape varieties planted on yhe island ar Posip (white wine), and Plavac Mali (red wine). A couple of wineries on the island are worth a visit, such as Stina Winery - a stae-of-art winery locatd at Bol's quayside.

Brac > Pakleni Islands

After lunch, head to the Pakleni islands.

Paklinski or Pakleni islands, translated as Hell's islands, Along with Kornati national park, the islands are probably its most visited part of Croatia.

South of Ždrilca is Mlini bay, and, according to many, the most beautiful bay of the Pakleni islands. A small island in the bay changes daily from a peninsula to an island according to the tide. The west side of Ždrilca and Mlini ends with the islands of Planikovac and Borovac, offering plenty of shade and a beautiful view just a couple of meters from the coast.

Vis > Korcula

One of the greenest islands in the Adriatic Sea, with abundant vineyards and olive groves, Korcula is known for keeping tradition alive with age-old religious ceremonies, folk music and dances.

This island is known for its dense forest and the ancient Greeks called the island Black Korcula (Kerkyra melaina) for this reason.

At night well known Moreska Sword Dance, a colourful, choreographed sword dance is also worth seeing. The historic town of Korčula is on UNESCO's- tentative list.

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Korcula > Lastovo

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Lastovo's archipelago has unique beauty with its mesmerizing crystal clear coastline which never to fails to amaze guests from all around the world..There are lot's of hidden bays that are not accessible by land.

Lastovo is encompassed by a Its white rocky shores are accompanied by the shade of pine trees which create a seaside oasis, ideal for a day by the sea.

Numerous bays, cliffs and an island group called Lastovnjaci on the eastern side are a real submarine "heaven" for divers. If you want to learn to dive, the island offers two diving schools.

Lastovo > Mljet



Mljet is Dalmatia's most southerly, most verdant and, some would argue, most beautiful isle. With its National Park with unique woods of Aleppo pine, cliffy coasts, caves, mud and mineral springs and two spectacular salt lakes in its centre, Mljet is a favorite stop for many.

Visitors are almost entirely drawn to the tourist enclave around Pomena. The remainder of the island retains the unspoilt air of tranquillity that, according to legend, captivated Odysseus for seven years.

Mjlet > Dubrovnik

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Early morning departure to arrive to Dubrovnik.

Wrapped in a tightly knit ribbon of stone walls, Dubrovnik perches dramatically on cliffs over the turquoise Adriatic Sea. The Unesco-listed old town, quaint surroundings and stunning coastline make Dubrovnik an ideal destination.

In addition to world-renowned architecture and global stardom for its role as King's Landing in Game of Thrones. Take in the splendour of Stradun, the main street, then lose yourself in the grid of narrow stone alleyways. Don't avoid the stairs – they lead up to the town's most picturesque, residential areas.
